#### **Curriculum Overview – National Curriculum**

- We have an exciting and full year of learning ahead full details are available on the school website.
- Highlights this term:
  - English: we will be using a range of high quality texts covering many genres including poetry.
  - Maths: units to develop understanding of place value, addition, subtraction, shape and money.
  - Science: extending knowledge of materials and their properties; learning about living things and their habitats around the world
  - Art & Design: this term we will explore and draw inspired by the natural environment.
  - **Computing:** we will learn about IT around us, then begin to write algorithms to program robots.
  - Design Technology: using simple needlework, we will design and create a festive decoration.
  - Geography: we will develop better understanding of world continents and oceans.
  - History: learning about some interesting local individuals from the past
  - Music: Inspiring Music will deliver the first of two terms of lessons, learning to play the "Pbuzz".
  - Physical Education: games and gymnastics to develop fundamental movement skills (balance, coordination, travelling).
  - Relationship & Health Education: understanding themselves and their relationships; valuing differences.
  - Religious Education: significant times / celebrations; sacred books and stories.
  - Values: this term's monthly values are respect, resilience, peace and patience.

#### **Phonics and Early Reading (1)**

- The children will consolidate phase 3, 4 and 5 phonics and progress to phase 6, the final stage of the Letters and Sounds programme.
- In Phase 6 children will continue to develop three word reading skills :
  - reading words automatically if they are very familiar
  - decoding them quickly and silently using well established sounding and blending
  - decoding words aloud.
- A further Phase 6 goal is for children to become confident spellers, starting to spell more complex words, for example:
  - using **suffixes** to indicate tenses
  - the rules for adding -ing, -ed, -er, -est, -ful, -ly and -y
  - plural spelling (-s, -es, -ies)
  - using **prefixes** to change words (e.g un-, dis-)



#### **Phonics and Early Reading (2)**

- Reading comprehension skills will be developed, including:
  - Checking that the text **makes sense** to them as they read, and **correcting any errors**.
  - Making **inferences** based on what is being said and done.
  - Predicting what might happen on the basis of what has been read so far.
  - Participating in discussion about books, poems and other works
- Reading books, closely matched to children's level of phonics understanding, will be changed weekly.
- The children will have the opportunity to bring home a library book of their choice to share.
- Further reading and comprehension activities will be available on Bug
   Club.



#### Writing

Pre-cursive (looped) handwriting, begun in year 1, is developed.

 When this is secured, children are taught fully cursive (looped) handwriting

Children write in sentences punctuated with capital letters and full stops.

A wider range of punctuation is taught, including commas in list sentences and apostrophes for contracted forms and possession.

 Writing is valued across the curriculum, and children will have opportunities to write across many genre, including fiction, non-fiction and poetry.

 Writing independence and stamina are developed, with children undertaking weekly Author's Hours.





#### **Maths**

- In daily maths lessons, children will follow a CPA approach, working with concrete resources (physical objects), pictorial representations (pictures) and finally in the abstract (only using numbers / symbols).
- The year 2 maths curriculum includes:
  - Writing numbers to 100 in numerals and words.
  - Recognising the value of each digit in two-digit numbers.
  - Addition and subtraction, and knowing they are inverse operations.
  - Multiplication and division, and knowing they are inverse operations.
  - Knowing the multiplication and division facts within the 2, 5 and 10 times tables.
  - Being familiar with the fractions 1/3, 1/4, 2/4 and 3/4.
  - Being able to use the symbols for pounds (£) and pence (p).
  - Knowing that an hour has 60 minutes and a day has 24 hours.
  - Explaining properties of 2D shapes. (number of sides, vertices)
  - Explaining properties of 3D shapes. (number of edges, faces and vertices, shapes of faces)
  - Being able to construct and interpret simple tally charts, pictograms, tables and block diagrams.



#### **Home Learning Expectations Year 1 & 2**


- Children are expected to practise core skills every week:
  - Reading (daily with an adult),
  - Number facts practised and recalled online using Sumdog.
  - Multiplication and division facts, recalled in any order at speed
    - Year 1: x2, x5, x10
    - Year 2: x2, x5, x10, x3, x4
- Children should learn and rehearse the information sent home on knowledge organisers.





#### Reading:


- All learning becomes more easily accessible when you read fluently. It allows you to focus on comprehension and taking on board what the information is, whether that be a story, poem, recipe or information.
- EY and KS1 plus less confident readers should be reading daily to an adult to see the most benefit and progress.
- KS2 children should be reading daily although perhaps not always to an adult.






#### Statutory Assessment from the DfE

- The Year 2 Phonics Screening Re-Check:
  - A phonics check that involves reading 40 words (20 real words and 20 made up words) to show that your child is able to decode at the required expectation.
  - For children that did not meet the expectation in Year 1.
  - Takes place in June 2023.
- End of Key Stage 1 Assessments:
  - Assessments in English & Maths (Tests and Teacher Assessments).
  - Assesses achievement at the end of Key Stage 1.
  - Take place throughout May of Year 2.







# Uniform Expectations: Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and 2

- All children are expected to wear the correct school uniform:
  - Grey shorts/ trousers/ skirt or pinafore dress
  - White polo shirt plain or with school logo
  - School jumper or cardigan with school logo
  - Sensible black shoes (not trainers)
  - Grey socks or tights
  - In the Summer Term, navy blue and white checked gingham dresses may be worn
- Sports and PE Kit:
  - School sports shirt (navy and red) with school logo, navy shorts or jogging bottoms, navy socks, plimsolls or trainers. School jumpers, fleeces or plain navy blue jumpers may also be worn on PE days.

#### **PE and Physical Activity**

- All classes Y1-6 have two PE sessions a week. Children should come to school in their PE kit on these days. Our class PE days are:
  - Wednesday & Friday
- In addition to PE lessons, we expect all children to engage in additional physical activity. This can be in their play, but also through specific activities such as, 'The Golden Mile,' which takes place most days and builds fitness and stamina for all children.





#### **Health and Safety**

- For safety reasons children should not wear jewellery in school. If your child has pierced ears, then studs only are accepted.
- A child may wear a watch, but the school cannot accept responsibility for it.
- Long hair (shoulder length or longer) should be tied back with red or navy bands.



#### Food & Drinks (snacks and lunchtimes)

- No nuts or foods containing nuts.
- Healthy Snacks:
  - Provided for all children in N-Y2, but children may also bring their own snack.
  - All snacks must be a piece of raw fruit or vegetable no other snacks will be permitted.
- Water Bottles:
  - All children should bring a water bottle this should contain water only.
- Lunch:
  - Reception Year 2 may have a funded school meal or a packed lunch.
  - Packed lunches should be balanced and healthy and contain no more than one cake/chocolate item.



### Free School Meals / Pupil Premium

#### Qualifying benefits to receive free school meals

The qualifying benefits to receive free school meals for children in Year 3 and over are:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and you have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working) Tax Credit)

#### Free School Meals / Pupil Premium

- All children eligible for Free School Meals receive:
  - An individual plan to support learning,
  - Reduced price school visits,
  - Free Milk at morning break (if requested),
  - Free School Lunches,
  - A yearly uniform voucher,
  - Free access to Breakfast Club every day,
  - Reduced price after school clubs,
  - A termly book linked to in-class learning (to keep forever)
  - Additional support in discussion with the Class Teacher and Pupil Premium Lead (Mrs Dawes).
